





# Free Stem Kits and Hands On Science Activities

Leading Research

The Civil Air Patrol wants to support educators in their efforts to make STEM resources and fun activities available to their student. An educator may join Civil Air Patrol as an Aerospace Education Member and request free curriculum including fun hands on activities and one valuable STEM kit each year. If the educator uses the STEM kit one year, they can request another for the following year. There are currently ten kits including a flight simulator, a rocketry kit, a telescope, a robot, a remote-controlled quadcopter, and more. The kits and curriculum can be previewed at ea.capmembers.com. Idaho Power has granted The Idaho Civil Air Patrol \$10,000 dollars for educators including after school program educators, to join the program for free (usually a \$35 fee to become a lifetime member). The Grant also includes transportation funding for class field trips to local airports. As a career-long IEA member and the current Director of Aerospace Education for the Idaho Wing, I want to guide as many educators, certificated and ESP IEA members, through the available resources and application for Aerospace Education Membership as possible. Not many know of these enjoyable, easily accessible opportunities.
